Key Vocabulary: Form and Sculpture

3D Shape: 3D shapes are shapes with three dimensions, such as width, height and depth. An example of a 3D shape is a prism or a sphere.

Mask: A covering for all or part of the face, often worn to disguise the wearer's identity.

Texture: The appearance or feel of something, especially a surface. Some surfaces/materials have a rough texture and some have a smooth one.

Collage: A type of art work where you use lots of different materials like pasta tubes, wool, old magazines, egg boxes etc. to create a 3D effect.

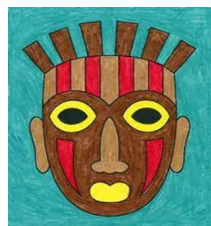
Outline: A line or shape marking the boundaries of a figure or object.

Tone: The lightness or darkness of a colour (hence dark and light tones).

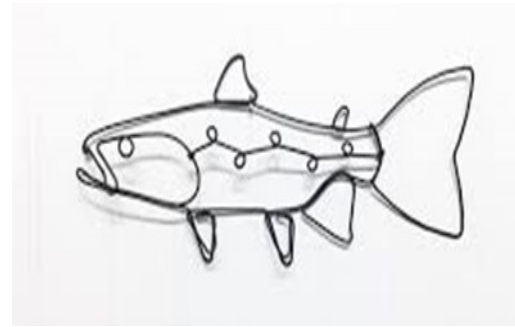
Overlap: Overlapping in art is the placement of objects over one another in order to create the illusion of depth.

Transparent: An object that lights let through it is transparent. An object that you can see through is transparent such as glass or a clear plastic container.
