- All people are equal

Worship:

- Sikh people worship both in public and private. Sikhs worship together in the Gurdwara. The Gurdwara means door to the Guru.

Vocabulary

Panj Kakka	The 5K's or five items that Sikh people wear to show their commitment.
Guru Granth Sahib	The holy book for Sikh people.
Waheguru	The belief in one God.
Gurdwara	Holy place of worship for Sikh people.
Guru Nanak	The founder of Sikhism and one of the ten Gurus.
Vaisakhi	A festival which is celebrated by Sikhs.
Sewa	Selfless service
Langar	Communal meal which is shared to people in the Gurudwara.



5K's

- Kesh – leaving hair uncut
- Kangha – A wooden comb
- Kara – A silver steel bangle.
- Kachera – Cotton shorts
- Kirpan – A sword worn by Sikhs
